  - a. What is the view of suffering for doing good (3:14)? Is it something to be avoided? Or a blessing?
  - b. What is the example of Christ in suffering for doing good?
  - c. According to 4:1 then, what mindset should we take up?

3) What does it mean that "whoever has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin" (v1b)? (4 mins)

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- a. Notice the logical signposting words at the start of verse 2. How does verse 2 interpret verse 1b?
  - i. Though we still live in the presence of sin, we no longer live under the power and punishment of sin. Or to put it in other words, it's a qualitative change.
- b. According to verse 2, what are we no longer living for? And what are we living for?
  - i. Not living for the rest of the time in the flesh for human passions, but living the rest of that time for the will of God. i.e. Living this life not for our own pleasure but for the will of God.
- 4) What does it mean to live this life for human passions? (3 mins)
  - a. How does verse 3 explain this?
  - b. What is the reaction of people when we do not live for such things? (v4)
    - Malign = do evil. Malevolent intent. "to speak ill of someone or something, often with the intention of causing harm or damage to their reputation. It involves making negative or harmful statements about a person, thing, or idea."<sup>10</sup>
  - c. Where does this lifestyle lead? (v5)
- 5) Verse 6 says that "this is why the gospel was preached even to those who are dead" (ESV). What does this mean? (3 minutes)
  - i. The NIV and NLT use a level of interpretation and translate this as "those who are now dead", which isn't in the Greek as I understand it.
  - b. Is it that the gospel was preached to those who have since died?
  - c. Is it that the gospel was preached to those who at the time were dead?
    - i. See also 1 Peter 3:18-20
  - d. Is it that the gospel was preached to those who are spiritually dead?
  - e. Is it something else?
  - f. Why have you chosen the interpretation you have? How firmly do you hold to it?
- 6) Why was this gospel preached to the dead? Whoever they might be? (v6b) (2 mins)
  - a. How might this motivate us to Lead to Jesus?
  - b. Check out William Booth's 'Vision of the Lost'; what impact does it have on you to 'Lead to Jesus'? What images, words or ideas stand out to you? Why?
